GENERAL SITUATION

Warm, dry conditions continue over the area as this crop is quickly coming to an end in many locations; a little to quick in some places. Some harvest aids have been applied already as the early planted cotton is opening quickly. Harvest will not be to far off now.

INSECTS

Insects still remain very light around the area. Almost no stinkbugs, aphids, or spider mites can be found. Most cotton is past the stage of being susceptible to insect damage except for the latest planted fields. We will still want to watch out for aphids.

PECAN WEEVILS

Pecan weevils have started emerging, applications should start going out if you have not made one and follow up with a second and possibly third 10-12 days after. Emergence may be prolonged with the drier soil.

SURGARCANE APHIDS

Sugarcane aphids are still present in several area milo fields. Their numbers do not seem to be expanding much. They just seem to be "hanging out." I would definitely keep an eye on them.
